

The Birds of Hattah Lakes National Park

INTRODUCTION

This Bird List for Hattah Lakes National Park, compiled by N. H. E. McDonald, National Park Ranger, should prove of great value to those interested in this aspect of our native fauna.

The native species are listed in the order and with the name used by W. Roy Wheeler in "A Hand List of the Birds of Victoria", published by the Victorian Ornithological Research Group in 1967.

Wheeler listed 437 species as having been recorded in Victoria, and 200 have been listed for the Hattah Lakes National Park. The total would no doubt be even more impressive if we were to consider also the adjoining Kulkyne State Forest and its miles of frontage to the Murray River.

No fewer than 26 birds listed by Wheeler as "Rare" for Victoria and 38 described as "Rather Rare" appear on the Hattah List.

The 26 rare species are listed hereunder for ease of reference:

Mallee-fowl, Painted Snipe, Glossy Ibis, Little Bittern, Collared Sparrow hawk, Square-tailed Kite, Black-breasted Buzzard, Grey Falcon, Little Corella, Spotted Nightjar, Black-eared Cuckoo, Red-throated Whistler, Ground Cuckoo-shrike, Chestnut Quail-thrush, Chestnut-crowned Babbler, Crimson Chat, Orange Chat, Rufous Fieldwren, Striated Grass-wren, Mallee Emuwren, Black-faced Wood-swallow, Black Honeyeater, Dusky Miner, Apostle-bird, Spotted Bower-bird, Pied Butcher-Bird.

It is interesting to compare the Hattah records with H. E. Tarr's list for Wyperfeld National Park—approximately 50 miles in a direct line to the south-south-west. From the Hattah list, 5 of the "rare" species and 5 of the "rather rare" ones are not listed for Wyperfeld. In some cases, the records are only of single birds, but in many cases the birds are relatively plentiful in both areas. The records illustrate the value of both parks in habitat conservation for our native birds.

The Little Desert National Park, 60 miles south-south-west of Wyperfeld, is an additional link in the conservation of habitat for this purpose.

- EMU Dromaius novae-hollandiae Resident. Numerous at times.
- 2. LOWAN/MALLEE-FOWL Leipoa ocellata Resident. Sparse distribution.
- 3. STUBBLE-QUAIL Coturnix pectoralis Migrant. Scarce.
- 4. LITTLE QUAIL Turnix velox Migrant. Rare.
- RED-CROWNED PIGEON Ptilinopus regina One sub-adult male found dead, winter 1966. Third Victorian record.
- PEACEFUL DOVE Geopelia placida Mainly resident. Uncommon.
- 7. DIAMOND DOVE G. cuneata Rare.
- 8. COMMON BRONZEWING Phaps chalcoptera) Resident. Fairly frequent in scrub.
- 9. CRESTED PIGEON Ocyphaps lophotes Resident. Plentiful, often in flocks.
- BANDED LANDRAIL Hypotaenidia philippensis Occasional.
- 11. BLACK-TAILED NATIVE HEN Tribonyx ventralis Nomadic.
- 12. **DUSKY MOORHEN** Gallinula tenebrosa One immature bird, Lake Hattah, 12 May, 1971. Other records since.
- 13. COOT Fulica atra Plentiful on water.
 - 14. EASTERN SWAMPHEN Porphyrio melanotus At times. Prefers reed-beds.
 - GREAT CRESTED GREBE Podiceps cristatus Spring and summer resident.
 - LITTLE GREBE P. ruficollis Often seasonal.
 - 17. **HOARY-HEADED GREBE** P. polioce-phalus Often on water.
 - 18. BLACK CORMORANT Phalacrocorax carbo Common when water is present.
 - LITTLE BLACK CORMORANT P. sulcirostris Abundant on water.
 - 20. PIED CORMORANT P. varius Rare. Dependent on water.
 - 21. LITTLE PIED CORMORANT P. melanoleucus Most abundant of the cormorants.
 - 22. AUSTRALIAN DARTER Anhinga novaehollandiae Few. Lakes and streams.
 - 23. AUSTRALIAN PELICAN Pelecanus conspicillatus Regular visitor to lakes.
 - 24. MARSH TERN/WHISKERED TERN Chlidonias hybrida Follows waters in spring.
 - 25. GULL-BILLED TERN Gelochelidon nilotica Rare. Irregular, follows waters during Spring.

- 26. SILVER GULL Larus novae-hollandiae-Irregular.
- 27. RED-KNEED DOTTEREL Erythrogonys cinetus Occasionaliy about lake shores.
- 28. AUSTRALIAN SPUR-WINGED PLOVER Lobibyx novae-hollandiae Resident. Fairly numerous about water margins.
- 29. BANDED PLOVER Zonifer tricolor Infrequent. Prefers open plains.
- RED-CAPPED DOTTEREL Charadrius alexandrinus Occasional. Prefers brackish waters.
- 31. BLACK-FRONTED DOTTEREL Charadrius melanops Pairs. Constant about lake margins.
- 32. **WHITE-HEADED** STILT Himantopus leucocephalus) Small parties. Lake shores. Irregular.
- 33. **RED-NECKED AVOCET** Recurvirostra novae-hollandiae Irregular. Prefers salt and brackish waters.
- GREENSHANK Tringa nebularia Singly. Lake margins. Occasional.
- 35. SHARP-TAILED SANDPIPER Erolia acuminata Spring and Summer resident. Flocks about stream and lake margins.
- RED-NECKED/LITTLE STINT E. ruficollis Rare. Lake margins.
- 37. AUSTRALIAN SNIPE Gallinago hardwickii Spring and summer resident. Marshy areas. Rare.
- 38. PAINTED SNIPE Rostratula benghalensis Rare. Nomadic. Marshes.
- SOUTHERN STONE-CURLEW Burhinus magnirostris Resident. Singly. Sparse distribution.
- 40. GLOSSY IBIS Plegadis falcinellus Lake shores. Occasional.
- 41. AUSTRALIAN WHITE IBIS Threskiornis molucca Fairly constant about lakes and swamps.
- 42. **STRAW-NECKED IBIS** *T. spinicollis* Flocks. Usually near water.
- ROYAL SPOONBILL Platalea regia Singly or pairs. Lake and stream margins.
- YELLOW-BILLED SPOONBILL P. flavipes Small parties. Fairly frequent about water.
- 45. LITTLE EGRET Egretta garzetta Singly Rare shore wader.
- 46. WHITE EGRET E. alba Singly or in pairs. Fairly frequent about shallow water.

- 47. WHITE-FACED HERON Ardea novaehollandiae Singly. Common about water.
- 48. WHITE-NECKED/PACIFIC HERON A. pacifica Solitary. Dependent on water.
- 49. NANKEEN NIGHT-HERON Nycticorax caledonicus Nocturnal wader. Often roosts in communities.
- 50. LITTLE BITTERN Ixobrychus minutus Rare. Skulks amongst reeds and heavy water-side growth.
- MANED GOOSE/WOOD-DUCK Chenonetta jubata Pairs or flocks. Partial to woodland waters. Fairly common at times.
- 52. BLACK SWAN Cygnus atratus Very common on waters.
- 53. CHESTNUT-BREASTED SHELDUCK/
 MOUNTAIN DUCK Casarca tadornoides
 Pairs. Fairly common about water.
- 54. GREY/BLACK DUCK Anas superciliosa Common on water.
- CHESTNUT TEAL A. castanea
 Occasional. Pairs and flocks. Salt or fresh
 water.
- GREY TEAL A. gibberifrons Pairs or flocks. Very common on water.
- 57. BLUE-WINGED SHOVELER A. rhynchotis. Pairs. Uncommon. Dependent upon water.
- 58. PINK-EARED DUCK Malacorhynchus membranaceus. Pairs or flocks. Dependent on water. Irregular. Not common.
- 59. HARDHEAD/AUSTRALIAN WHITE-EYED DUCK Aythya australis Pairs or flocks. Fairly common on deep water.
- 60. BLUE-BILLED DUCK Oxyura australis Rare. Deep waters and vegetated islands.
- 61. MUSK DUCK Biziura lobata Pairs on deep waters. Sometimes fairly numerous.
- 62. SWAMP HARRIER Circus approximans Singly and pairs. Not common.
- 63. AUSTRALIAN GOSHAWK Accipiter fasciatus Singly or pairs. Uncommon.
- 64. COLLARED SPARROWHAWK A. cirrocephalus Singly or pairs. Not plentiful.
- 65. WEDGE-TAILED EAGLE Aquila audax Resident. Pairs. Widely distributed.
- 66. AUSTRALIAN LITTLE EAGLE Hieraaetus morphnoides Resident. Pairs.
- 67. WHISTLING EAGLE/KITE (Haliastur sphenurus) Resident. Pairs.

- 68. WHITE-BREASTED SEA-EAGLE Haliaeetus leucogaster Pairs. Sparse distribution.
- 69. BLACK/FORK-TAILED KITE Milvus migrans Occasional.
- 70. SQUARE-TAILED KITE Lophoictinia isura Very rare. Juvenile recorded at Lake Hattah, 16.12.1971.
- 71. **BLACK-BREASTED BUZZARD** Hamirostra melanosterna Long-standing records by L. G. Chandler, Red Cliffs. Not seen in recent years.
- 72. AUSTRALIAN BLACK-SHOULDERED KITE Elanus notatus Isolated pairs.
- 73. LITTLE FALCON Falco longipennis Rare.
- 74. PEREGRINE FALCON F. peregrinus Rare.
- GREY FALCON F. hypoleucus Rarest of the local birds of prey.
- 76. BROWN FALCON/HAWK F. berigora Resident. Pairs. Open areas mainly.
- 77. NANKEEN KESTREL F. cenchroides Resident. Pairs.
- 78. BOOBOOK/SPOTTED OWL Ninox novae-seelandiae Resident. Pairs.
- 79. WINKING OWL/BARKING OWL N. connivens Pairs. Rare.
- 80. BARN OWL Tyto alba Pairs. Uncommon.
- 81. MUSK LORIKEET Trichoglossus concinna
- 82. PURPLE-CROWNED LORIKEET Glossopsitta porphyrocephala Occasional flocks.
- 83: WHITE COCKATOO Kakatoe galerita Often fairly numerous. Flocks.
- 84. PINK COCKATOO K. leadbeateri Resident. Pairs and flocks increasing.
- 85. LITTLE CORELLA K. sanguinea Flocks. Irregular. Shows preference for trees beside water.
- GALAH K. roseicapilla Very common resident.
- COCKATIEL Leptolophus hollandicus
 Partially nomadic. Small parties. Spring
 and summer resident.
- 88. REGENT PARROT Polytelis anthopeplus Resident. Flocks and small parties.
- 89. YELLOW ROSELLA Platycercus flaveolus Resident. Pairs, small parties. Common in forest areas.
- EASTERN ROSELLA P. eximius Rare Needs further confirmation.
- 91. RINGNECK PARROT Barnardius barnardi Resident. Pairs and common.

- 92. RED-BACKED PARROT/RED-RUMPED PARROT Psephotus haematonotus Resident. Flocks. Common.
- 93. MULGA/SPECTRUM PARROT P. varius Resident Pairs and small parties. Fairly common in big mallee areas.
- 94. BLUE BONNET P. haematogaster
 Resident. Pairs and small parties. Keeps
 mainly to belah and big mallee
- 95. **BLUE-WINGED PARROT** Neophema chrysostoma Rare. Irregular?
- 96. **BUDGERYGAH** Melopsittacus undulatus Flocks. Nomadic. Spring and Summer resident.
- 97. TAWNY FROGMOUTH Podargus strigoides Resident. Singly. Fairly common.
- 98. OWLET-NIGHTJAR Aegotheles cristata Resident. Uncommon.
- 99. LAUGHING KOOKABURRA Dacelo gigas Resident. Pairs. Fairly common in forest areas.
- 100. **RED-BACKED KINGFISHER** Halcyon pyrrhopygius Spring and summer resident. Pairs.
- 101. SACRED KINGFISHER H. sanctus Spring and summer resident. Pairs.
- 102. RAINBOW-BIRD Merops ornatus Spring and summer resident. Fairly common.
- 103. SPOTTED NIGHTJAR Eurostopodus guttatus Resident. Singles. Sparsely distributed.
- 104. SPINE-TAILED SWIFT Hirundapus caudacutus Scattered flocks. Occasional.
- 105. FORK-TAILED SWIFT Apus pacificus Scattered flocks. Occasional.
- 106. PALLID CUCKOO Cuculus pallidus Spring arrival. Pairs.
- 107. FAN-TAILED CUCKOO Cacomantis pyrrhophanus Spring arrival. Pairs. Rare.
- 108. BLACK-EARED CUCKOO Misocalius osculans Very rare.
- HORSFIELD BRONZE-CUCKOO Chalcites basalis Spring arrival. Scattered pairs.
- 110. **WELCOME SWALLOW** Hirundo neoxena Resident. Very common.
- 111. WHITE-BACKED SWALLOW Cheramoeca leucosterna Partly nomadic. Red sand rises.
- 112. AUSTRALIAN TREE-MARTIN Hylochelidon nigricans Resident. Flocks.
- 113. FAIRY MARTIN H. ariel Nomadic. Irregular. Flocks. Associates with Nos. 110 and 112.

- 114. GREY FANTAIL Rhipidura fuliginosa Pairs. Irregular?
- 115. WILLIE WAGTAIL R. leucophrys Resident. Pairs. Fairly common.
- 116. RESTLESS FLYCATCHER Seisura inquieta Resident. Pairs. Uncommon.
- 117. JACKY WINTER Microeca leucophaea Resident. Pairs. Sparse distribution.
- 118. RED-CAPPED ROBIN Petroica goodenovii Resident. Pairs.
- 119. FLAME ROBIN P. phoenicea Rare. Winter visitor.
- 120. **HOODED ROBIN** P. cucullata Resident. Uncommon. Pairs.
- 121. GOLDEN WHISTLER Pachycephala pectoralis Resident. Odd pairs.
- 122. RUFOUS WHISTLER P. rufiventris Resident. Pairs. Fairly frequent.
- 123. **RED-THROATED WHISTLER** *P. rufo-gularis* Pairs. Very rare.
- 124. GILBERT WHISTLER P. inornata Pairs. Very rare.
- 125. **GREY SHRIKE-THRUSH** Colluricincla harmonica Pairs. Resident. Fairly well distributed.
- 126. MAGPIE-LARK Grallina cyanoleuca Resident. Pairs. Common near water.
- 127. CRESTED BELLBIRD Oreoica gutteralis Resident. Pairs. Uncommon.
- 128. GROUND CUCKOO-SHRIKE Pteropodocys maxima Small parties. Uncommon.
- 129. BLACK-FACED CUCKOO-SHRIKE Coracina novae-hollandiae Parties and small flocks, mainly in spring.
- 130. LITTLE CUCKOO-SHRIKE C. robusta Apparently rare and irregular.
- 131. WHITE-WINGED TRILLER Lalage sueurii Spring arrival. Pairs.
- 132. CHESTNUT QUAIL-THRUSH Cinclosoma castanotum Resident. Pairs, Scattered throughout porcupine grass areas.
- 133. SOUTHERN SCRUB-ROBIN Drymodes brunneopygia Resident. Scattered pairs.
- 134. WHITE-BROWED BABBLER Pomatostomus superciliosus Resident. Small parties.
- 135. CHESTNUT-CROWNED BABBLER P. ruficeps Resident. Small parties.
- 136. WHÎTE-FRONTED CHAT Epthianura albifrons Pairs and small parties. Open areas.
- 137. CRIMSON CHAT E. tricolor Flocks. Irregular.

- 138. ORANGE CHAT E. aurifrons Flocks; Rare and irregular.
- BROWN WEEBILL Smicrornis brevirostris Resident. Small parties. Common.
- 140. EASTERN WHITEFACE Aphelocephala leucopsis Resident. Parties. Keeps to fairly open places.
- 141. LITTLE THORNBILL Acanthiza nana Resident. Small parties. Mainly in scrub.
- 142. RED-TAILED THORNBILL A. pusilla hamiltoni Resident. Small parties. Keeps to scrub.
- 143. CHESTNUT-TAILED THORNBILL A. uropygialis Resident. Small parties.

 Mainly in scrub.
- 144. YELLOW-TAILED THORNBILL A. chrysorrhoa Resident. Common.
- 145. SHY GROUND-WREN Hylacola cauta Resident. Odd pairs. Scrub.
- 146. RUFOUS FIELD-WREN Calamanthus campestris Isolated pairs in saline depressions.
- 147. BROWN SONGLARK Cinclorhamphus cruralis Spring arrival. Odd pairs in grassy areas.
- 148. RUFOUS SONGLARK C. mathewsi Spring arrival. Pairs. Timber.
- 149. STRIATED GRASS-WREN Amytornis striatus Resident. Scattered throughout porcupine grass areas.
- 150. LITTLE GRASSBIRD Megaluris gramineus Pairs. Uncommon Rank waterside growth.
- 151. AUSTRALIAN REED-WARBLER Acrocephalus australis Spring arrival.
- 152. MALLEE EMU-WREN Stipiturus mallee Resident. Small parties. Porcupine grass.
- 153. BLACK-BACKED BLUE WREN Malurus melanotus Resident. Small parties. Scrub.
- 154. PURPLE-BACKED WREN M. assimilis Resident. Small parties. Scrub.
- 155. WHITE-BREASTED WOOD-SWALLOW Artamus leucorhynchus Spring arrival. Flocks. About water.
- 156. MASKED WOOD-SWALLOW A. personatus Spring arrival. Flocks. Associates with No. 157.
- 157. WHITE-BROWED WOOD-SWALLOW A. superciliosus Spring arrival. Flocks. Common.
- 158. BLACK-FACED WOOD-SWALLOW A. cinereus Trregular. Small parties.

- 159. DUSKY WOOD-SWALLOW A. cyanopterus Resident. Parties or small flocks.
- 160. BLACK-CAPPED SITTELLA Neositta pileata Resident. Small parties.
- 161. **BROWN** TREE-CREEPER Climacteris picummus Resident. Fairly common.
- 162. MISTLETOE-BIRD Dicaeum hirundin aceum Resident. Pairs.
- 163. YELLOW-TAILED PARDALOTE Pardalotus xanthopygus Resident. Pairs. Mallee scrub. Common.
- 164. STRIATED PARDALOTE P. substriatus Resident. Pairs. Very common.
- 165. EASTERN STRIATED PARDALOTE P. ornatus Resident? Odd pairs.
- 166. GREY-BACKED SILVEREYE Zosterops lateralis Flocks. Irregular.
- BROWN-HEADED HONEYEATER Melithreptus brevirostris Resident. Small parties.
- 168. STRIPED HONEYEATER Plectorhyncha lanceolata Resident. Pairs.
- 169. **BLACK HONEYEATER** Myzomela nigra Spring arrival. Pairs.
- 170. TAWNY-CROWNED HONEYEATER Gliciphila melanops Spring arrival?
- 171. WHITE-FRONTED HONEYEATER
 G. albifrons Flocks. Fairly numerous at times during some springs.
- 172. SINGING HONEYEATER Meliphaga virescens Odd pairs. Regular.
- 173. WHITE-EARED HONEYEATER M. leucotis Resident. Pairs, Common.
- 174. PURPLE-GAPED HONEYEATER M. cratitia Spring arrival? Flocks. Irregular?
- 175. YELLOW-PLUMED HONEYEATER M. ornata Resident. Pairs. Common.
- 176. WHITE-PLUMED HONEYEATER M. penicillata Resident. Fairly common, mainly in forest area.
- 177. NOISY MINER Myzantha melanocephala Resident. Very common. Forest.
- 178. YELLOW-THROATED MINER (M. flavigula Resident. Very common. Mallee.
- 179. DUSKY MINER M. obscura Resident. Odd parties in mallee areas.
- 180. RED WATTLE-BIRD Anthochaera carunculata Nomadic.
- 181. SPINY-CHEEKED HONEYEATER Acanthagenys rufogularis Resident. Fairly well distributed.

- 182. BLUE-FACED HONEYEATER Entomyzon cyanotis Resident. Small parties. Forest.
- 183. LITTLE FRIAR-BIRD Philemon citreogularis Spring arrival. Common.
- 184. AUSTRALIAN PIPIT Anthus australis Resident. Pairs. Open areas.
- 185. HORSFIELD BUSHLARK Mirafra javanica Rare. Irregular.
- 186. ZEBRA FINCH Taeniopygia castanotis Flocks. Irregular.
- 187. GREY JUMPER/APOSTLE-BIRD Struthidea cinerea Resident. Few flocks.
- 188. SPOTTED BOWER-BIRD Chlamydera maculata Very rare. Odd pairs.
- 189. AUSTRALIAN RAVEN Corvus coronoides Resident. Very common.
- 190. LITTLE CROW C. bennetti Resident. Small flocks.
- 191. WHITE-WINGED CHOUGH Corcorax melanorhamphus Resident. Small flocks. Fairly common.
- 192. BLACK-WINGED CURRAWONG Strepera melanoptera Resident. Pairs. Scrub.
- 193. PIED BUTCHER-BIRD Cracticus nigrogularis Resident. Odd pairs.
- 194. GREY BUTCHER-BIRD C. torquatus Resident. Pairs. Fairly common.
- 195. BLACK-BACKED MAGPIE Gymnorhina tibicen Resident. Pairs. Common.
- WHITE-BACKED MAGPIE G. hypoleuca Odd birds. Resident.


