NATIONAL PRESIDENT REPORT

2015/16 has been another important year for Parks and Leisure Australia (PLA) as it continues to grow, strengthen and develop as the peak industry body for professionals in the parks and leisure industry in Australia.

This year, we welcomed some new members to the National Board. Rachel Thorpe as WA Regional President and WA representative, Barbra Gaiotto, with the National Conference portfolio, Eve Craker representing the Generate Network Australia, and Anand Pillay with the research portfolio. I'd like to thank these new board members for volunteering their time and stepping up into their new roles.

A membership based organisation such as PLA relies on the ongoing support of sponsors and partners. We are fortunate to continue to have some great national sponsors in Tennis Australia, Greenlife Group, Jasstech Solutions, Toro Australia, Belgravia Leisure and Forpark Australia. Without the amazing support of these sponsors, PLA would not be able to provide the range of services it offers its members.

Our social media presence through the year has again been boosted by our partnership with KWP! This was particularly evident through our most successful social media campaign, the National Conference held in Sydney in October 2015. PLA has also ramped up its advocacy activities during the year. These activities included participation in the Living Cities Workshops held in Canberra in February and Sydney in August organised by AILA (Australian Institute of Landscape Architects). As part of the Federal Election Campaign, PLA Advisory prepared '10 Great Ideas for a More Active Healthy Australia.' This document puts the argument that new thinking is needed regarding infrastructure investment in Australia and that investment in health prevention through improved parks and leisure opportunities will lead to a population which is physically and mentally healthier. PLA Advisory members have also been busy working on a climate change position paper which the Board endorsed in August. Look out for a copy of this important paper soon. I'd like to thank the members of both the PLA Executive group and PLA Advisory general group for their efforts in research and preparing papers for use by PLA members across Australia. The hours spent by these groups to further the national interests of PLA are appreciated.

2015/16 has seen the most successful year yet for regional professional development seminars and conferences held right around Australia. The work of the committees and staff organising these conference events has paid off by providing quality opportunities for industry members who may not be able to attend national events to interact with colleagues and learn from best practice and innovation within their state.

I'd like to recognise and thank the members of our five Regional Councils who volunteer their time to provide a range of services to members at a regional level. These Regional Councils are all supported by amazing Executive Officers. Thanks to them all.

CEO REPORT

With another financial year behind us we reflect on what has been achieved and where we want to go. The last few years have certainly been challenging as we have deconstructed and reconstructed the organisation both by way of its physical location and its services and systems which are under constant review. This is perhaps the first year in which we feel we are getting on top of this and with a highly passionate and skilled National Board and office staff supported by the tireless work of our regional EO's and their committees, we have established some solid structures which have provided a foundation on which to build and grow the organisation.

Whilst we acknowledge there is continued room for improvement, our reporting and financial systems have become better managed and accountable and the policies and procedures being developed nationally by the Board have led to a greater sense of clarity and purpose for us all

As an almost fully self funded not for profit organisation, the importance of monitoring is obviously critical and our main income streams of membership, sponsorship and conferences and seminars need to be constantly assessed to ensure we remain viable. This year I am pleased to say that all income streams have shown an increase in profitability on previous years and I would personally like to thank both our members and our corporate partners and sponsors that have continued to support our professional association.

Some of the highlights this year have been the continued implementation of the Fifty Point Plan which is currently being reviewed and a new and refined strategic direction being implemented by the National Board. Specific outcomes from the key areas of the plan include a marked increase in national sponsorships and partnering with the likes of Forpark Australia, Tennis Australia, Greenlife Group, Toro, Jasstech, Belgravia Leisure, KWP! and Moore Stephens all of which have showed great support to the professional association. I would also like to personally thank Forpark for their long standing national sponsorship which comes to an end this year. Forpark have been a great partner and remain involved with PLA.

Advocacy remains high on the national agenda and this year has seen an increase in the profile of PLA and what we do as a sector by pre election lobbying and participating in the Living Cities workshop hosted by AILA in Canberra.

Relationships have been strengthened with our national and international partners including:

- the NZRA and their peer review for the rebuilding of Christchurch's sporting infrastructure;
- · closer links with the World Urban Parks (WUP) and member access to this organisation through PLA's membership:
- the re-signing of the MOU with NParks Singapore for a further three years to undertake training in the CUGE Parks Management course and ongoing seminars;
- the reigniting of a relationship with the Institute of Parks and Recreation Singapore;
- establishing and cementing relationships with our Tokyo counterparts with a visit in February 16: and
- ties with the USA and the LA parks department who will be speaking at our conference in Adelaide.

The membership restructure is still being assessed and considered by a national working party as it is crucial that we get this right. The rationale behind the change is in line with capturing large agencies and organisations and representing their interests whilst ensuring as many professionals in our sector benefit from our services and networking.

Myself and many of the national board members have represented PLA at state, national and international conferences and seminars and highlighted the importance and link with our sector and community wellbeing and the link with sport and health.

Training and professional development is core to what we do and in recent times we have partnered with, and at the time of writing this report were drafting the agreement with WUP and the Eppley Institute in the USA to administer our National Certificate in Parks and Leisure Management which will flow on to the International Certificate in Parks Management administered by WUP. This will provide our members with a long awaited national accreditation that will link with a Continuing Professional Development (CPD) scheme currently being developed between myself and the national board.

We are also working closely with a Trust Fund set up in the old 'RAIPR' days which sits outside of PLA's direct authority. The intent of this fund, which is administered by an independent group of Trustees, is to establish a 'research portal' on our website and to tie this in with a tertiary organisation here in Australia.

FINANCE DIRECTOR REPORT

I am pleased to report that the organisation has reported a surplus for the year of \$100,145 which is a far better result than the deficit of \$(51,903) reported the year before. In my opinion the closer regular monitoring of the performance against the budget set by each region has created the accountability required to ensure we achieved this result. In my role as the Finance Director I will not be satisfied until I see the organisation continuing to make surpluses every year.

Main points to highlight with respect to the 2016 Financial Statements are as follows:

- · Revenue from operations is up on last year by 30% due to increases in the areas of local state seminars/conferences along with sponsorship. With respect to sponsorship I would personally like to thank the CEO Mark Band and his team in enabling the sponsorship dollars to grow from \$191,059 to \$401,589 in (12) months.
- · In the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income we have recognised for the first time an income tax benefit of \$171,645 which states the value the organisation has in carried forward tax losses.
- The Statement of Financial Position shows our net equity position has improved from \$81,555 to \$353,345 which has come about through improved financial performance and the recognition of the future tax benefit.
- Current Assets to Current Liabilities show that we have an excess of \$181,700 (prior year \$81,555) meaning that for every \$1 of liabilities we have \$1.57 of short term assets which provides comfort that PLA has sufficient liquidity to be able to pay our debts as and when they fall due.

The budget set for the 2016/17 year shows that the organisation is targeting another surplus which is required to make the Statement of Financial Position more robust to maintain stability.

Finally, I would like to thank the other board members for the input and support in making PLA where it exists today. I can assure you that every effort is being made to ensure that this is not a one off result and I look forward to reporting a stronger position in twelve months time.

Included with the conference is the Awards of Excellence dinner, which attracted 230 quests (176 in 2015). Congratulations to all category winners and good luck in the National Awards. The Network is free for all young people (or people young at heart) who work in the environmental and recreation sector. The sector encompasses parks and reserves, sport and recreation delivery, swimming pools, and environmental management and planning.
