Existing Classification	Pocket
Dog leash Status	On leash
Planning Overlays	Heritage
Role & Context	 Very small pocket park in residential area. The only playground in the Studley Park area of the municipality. Its main function is associated with social /family/recreation. Very attractive park with an historic Victorian bluestone building forming a striking backdrop, and a magnificent cedar tree dominating the lawns of the park. Informal surveillance is easy from the street.
Functional Design Analysis	Good tree shade at certain times of the day.Target age group is toddler/junior.

Zone North Eastern	SIK WILLIAM SIKLLI KESEKVE
	 This play equipment is fairly limited but this is a reasonable attempt to provide a standard, multi- purpose item for this small space.
	 This limited type of play setting is clearly not adequate for this large precinct.
	 There is no specific provision for disabled access to this play equipment.

	This space could be enhanced in two possible ways:
	 A double swing with a strap seat and a toddler seat would be valuable,
Playground Recommendations	 A valuable addition would be to build a floor in the cubby under the deck, add something more interesting underneath to play with and add a small path that leads into a garden with a semi-circular seat.

Planning Overlays	
Role & Context	 An important park in this precinct
	 This part of Kew is densely populated and there is no other park or playground of reasonable size locally
	 Main function is associated with picnicking/social /family/recreation
	 The park is well used by parents with young children during the morning and Tai Chi



Precinct 2	EGLINTON RESERVE
Zone North Eastern	
Functional Design Analysis	• Shade is inadequate over this playground.
	• The site design is uninteresting.
	 Provision for adults is remote from the play. Young children require adults to be closer. The uphill retaining edge is useful however for seating.
	 Target age group is junior though generally the combination items are quite unsuitable for very young children.
	 Although both slides are aimed at young children, there is no suitable access to either of them.
	 The equipment does not provide for imaginative play.
	 There is no specific provision for disabled access to this play equipment.
	 This playground is inadequate for its role in this precinct:
	 decks are essentially the same height so there is little variety,
	 equipment is unsuitable for young children though this is an important group of users,
	 there is a reasonable set of climbing activities for junior children up to around 7, but it is uninteresting for older children,
	 the equipment is inaccessible to anyone who cannot or does not wish to tackle rungs.
	 Attractive park with undulating landform, large, with shade trees.
	Good Informal surveillance.
	 No toilet block.
	 Granitic gravel path crosses the reserve diagonally.
	 There is a BBQ linked to the path; some erosion would make this a little difficult for wheelchair access but minor maintenance would fix this.
	 There is a picnic shelter that is not connected to the main path.

	 Picnic tables are not an accessible design.
	 The park has a half court basketball area, and grassed space for other ball play.
Playground Recommendations	 Two options could be considered for this playground. See below.
	 Make minor improvements which will make existing items more usable:
	 replace both small rung ladders with a stair each,
	 drop the height of track ride so younger children can reach it,
	 Replace banister slide with another higher deck with a slightly more challenging slide or climbing item for older children. Relocate spring toy if required.
	 amend the under deck areas with some imaginative play items
	 These modifications will achieve some basic improvements to usability, but the playground will remain rather uniform in degree of challenge, inaccessible, and lacking in any imaginative play
	 An alternative approach requires a more serious investment in this space, acknowledging its importance in the precinct. This is considered to be a better long term outcome. Specifically:
	 design a new playground around a central, accessible, green, shady space for adults; the new playground would wrap around this in a keyhole shape,

	 make use of the slope to bring a path in from above, and provide easy ramped access to a moderately elevated play deck, linking to other decks for climbing, sliding etc.
	 design a good setting for imaginative play. Utilise the underneath spaces of decks and use landscape elements. Make sure these suit multi-age groups and all abilities,
	 make sure there is a logical gradation of heights and degrees of challenge and that basic play items such as slides can be reached by stairs [or ramp] as well as by more challenging options for access,
	 include two upper-body items and make sure that one is suitable for younger children and one for older children
	 add items with spinning and rocking motion,
	 add a new swing with back support (Little Tykes or similar),
	 make sure the space is visually interesting, set into the landscape, at least partially shady, and accessible.
Site Recommendations	 This site is one which really should have a toilet block.
	 Consider relocating the swing closer to the main playground.
	 Add new path to link shelter to main path.
	 New accessible picnic table utilising a central supporting post.

Planning Overlays	
	 The reserve is a through-space from residential areas west of Peel Street through to the shopping centre and to the kindergarten on Pakington Street.
	 Its main function is to provide a green space; visual amenity, a seating space and low key play.
Role & Context	 The small park is attractive, with its character derived from large exotic trees and urban elements such as a large brick wall backdrop.
	 Informal surveillance is excellent from houses across the street.



Precinct 2 Zone North Eastern	PEEL STREET RESERVE
	 There is a wide path and a picnic table setting but this is not connected to the path.
Functional Design Analysis	 Good shade. Target age group is toddler. Activities are limited to two spring toys. No provision for disabled access to this play equipment.
Playground Recommendations	 This small site does not offer much significant value for play, but is of value as a green space, as a respite and to punctuate journeys through the neighbourhood. The play equipment could be removed and some low attractive sculptures could replace it. The little park could become a journey along a series of small sculptures with which small children could engage, and for climbing and sitting. If they are very low they would not require softfall.
Site Recommendations	 It would be beneficial if the picnic table and possibly some additional seats under the trees could be made accessible via a seamless path off the main path (the edging would need to be removed as a barrier).

Functional Design Analysis	 The park is attractive, with a path system running through it. It has mixed evergreen and deciduous trees. There is some informal surveillance from the street and from houses, some of which are quite

	 close. There is some limited tree shade in the vicinity. Target age group is toddler/junior. The playground provides quite a good mix of physical activities and spatial complexity. It caters for a range of ages and for a range of skills in mobile children. There is no provision for disabled access. 	
Playground Recommendations	 There is no urgent need for to provide wheelchair access to this play equipment, because Hays Paddock is in this catchment. It would be easy to bring a small path off the main through-path and make an accessible table and seat setting, (in a new shelter). 	
Site Recommendations	 A picnic shelter and drinking water is recommended here to also provide for users of the trail who wish to take a break. Some attention to the landscape around the playground and additional planting would be of benefit.

Role & Context	 This playground is a major attraction, due in part to the fact that it was purpose built as an accessible play facility and secondly because it offers a good range of play activities in an interesting setting. Its main function is associated with picnicking/social /family/recreation and nearby
	sporting facilities.

Functional Design Analysis	 Target age group is a mixture of toddler/junior /senior. The equipment does provide for a wide range of activities including sand, musical elements, climbing and sliding, elevation and imaginative play. There is some shade from trees and sails; new sails are under production. There is a path system throughout and a many activities are accessible from a wheelchair. The play site is fully fenced. The park is large, with several barbecues, ovals, pavilion, a car park, creek and wetland, a strong backdrop of trees and the freeway embankment behind. There is no Informal surveillance. There is a public toilet block in the pavilion.

Role & Context	 This park backs onto a kindergarten. It is not far from Kew East primary school. The block next door is empty; (a disused bowling green). There is a well-used bike and foot pathway which cuts diagonally across the park. This links into several other bike routes Its main function is associated with low key play/recreation. There is no other park in this central section of the precinct, and a large residential area to the north does not have access to any park or play area. This magnifies the importance of this park above what might be expected for such a small reserve. Due to the popularity of Hays Paddock, local parks such as Windella Ave Reserve have become important as these are more immediately accessible.

Functional Design Analysis	 There is no shade over the playground. Target age group is a mixture of toddler/junior. The playground is extremely limited. There is no provision for disabled access to this play equipment. This small triangular reserve is slightly elevated above the street; it has a few magnificent eucalypts but otherwise no visual interest. The ex-bowling green site adjacent to this park contributes to a run-down feeling. This site has recently been sold, and will be developed for medium density housing which will put more pressure on this park. The kindergarten fence-line is exposed and open. There is good, informal surveillance from houses across the road. There is a path system but neither of the benches is connected to it.
Playground Recommendations	 This site, as mentioned above, is reasonably important as there is little open space locally. We recommend that the existing play equipment should be removed, the design should be an attractive garden/play space and if fenced could have an attractive sand play area, the focus for the design should be on the younger age groups and on a whole-park environment with shade.
Site Recommendations	 A new park design should be prepared. This should accommodate the through-path separately. The new path should not go across the play space or through the main park. It may be able to remain where it is, but this is to be determined. The design could take advantage of the small size and the whole park ,excluding the through-path, could be fenced.

Role & Context	 This park lies on a major bicycle trail through the northern part of the municipality. The parkland extends some distance south east, and links across the road and under the freeway to the Willsmere/Chandler Park system.
	 Its main function is associated with picnicking/social /family/recreation.

	 Due to the popularity of Hays Paddock, local parks such as Hyde Park have become important, as these are more immediately accessible.
Functional Design Analysis	There is limited shade.
	 Target age group is toddler/junior, with older children and teens provided for with ball games.
	 The playground has a good range of activities including physical /agility and imaginative with a fun 'gingerbread' theme.
	 There is no provision for disabled access to this play equipment which is a shame as the gingerbread house could have been usable by children with disabilities.
	 The park is attractive due to its undulating form and native trees.
	 There is reasonable informal surveillance from the road and some houses in White Street.
	 There is a shared path system close by, but this does not link into the play area, nor to tables.
	 There is a half court, a rebound wall and a large grassed ball play area near the playground. The ball play areas are not close enough to feel as if they are connected with the play area, however.
Playground Recommendations	 Consider adding one more imaginative play section at the junior end of this playground, which relates to the gingerbread house and which is wheelchair accessible at ground or low level.
	 Link this to the path and ensure there is adequate manoeuvring space for wheelchairs.
	Consider additional shade trees.

Role & Context	 This small playground is connected to the tennis club. This playground is fenced and is used predominantly by tennis club patrons. It does not have the same role as a public playground. Its main function is associated with /social /family/recreation during tennis, though it is open all the time
Functional Design Analysis	 The play area is tiny and fenced, it is close to tennis courts and the pavilion. Its has a backdrop of eucalypts which give it a bushland feel, and is well shaded. There is no informal surveillance. It is possible that children would play on the equipment unsupervised, unless the tennis players share the task of supervising children while they are playing.

	 The structure is constructed of very basic materials, with a slight domestic feel about it.
	 Target age group is a mixture of toddler/junior.
	 The access to all decks is via one ladder or one chain rung ladder/climber; These are difficult for very young children to use (especially unsupervised).
	 The equipment does not specifically provide for imaginative play.
	 There is no specific provision for disabled access to this play equipment.
Playground Recommendations	 This playground is not considered very important in the public distribution of parks and play spaces, as it is within the catchment area of Kate Campbell Reserve and Hyde Park.
	 It is recommended that as Jack O'Toole is a public park, a new playground be constructed to the standard expected for a public playground.

Planning Overlays	
Role & Context	 This park is part of a narrow tongue of land below the freeway embankment.
	 Its main function is associated with social /family/recreation and dog walking.
	 The park is in an attractive bowl with a backdrop of trees.
	 Informal surveillance is excellent from houses very close across the road.
	 There is a small informal parking area.
Functional Design Analysis	 A granitic gravel path leads to the edge of the mulch but does not provide access to the play equipment itself nor to the picnic table.
	 A path to seats/table is required.
	 There is no shade, but some of the play structure has a roof and new trees have been planted.
	 This play ground offers a good range of play activities for the younger age groups.



	 Target age group is toddler/junior.
	 The freestanding slide unit has a similar design flaw to other playgrounds in that there is only one (reasonably challenging) access to the slide. However as there are other slides, this is not considered important.
	 More importantly the deck has been placed within the fall zone of the base of the climbing net. This deck is the take-off deck for the track ride and is not really necessary as it is only a few millimeters above the mulch.
	 The equipment has an imaginative 'drovers' theme
	 There is no provision for disabled access to this play equipment which is a shame as this is one of the few types of setting which is easy to make accessible.
	Kate Campbell Reserve Discontant
Playground Recommendations	 Undertake a careful study of how to make the drover's cottage and the cubby under the hex- shaped deck wheelchair accessible and how to make some activities useable from a wheelchair.
	 Bring the path into the playground to link these areas and also the spring cart.

Existing Classification	 Local
Dog leash Status	 On leash
Planning Overlays	
	 The playground is located in the corner of the sloping reserve, directly adjacent to a pre-school.
Role & Context	 Its main function is associated with social /family/recreation.
	 The playground is important as it is the larger of only two in this precinct.
	 It needs to offer a good range of activities for a range of ages and abilities.
	•
	 There is no effective shade over the playground and only a few trees nearby.
Functional Design Analysis	 Target age group is junior /senior, with a few items younger children can use.
	 The location near the pre-school establishes a demand for toddler junior items, as children and young siblings use the playground after kindergarten sessions.



Precinct 4 Zone North Western	CASCADE PARK
	 Swings appear poorly sited, especially those closest to the equipment. Children running around the equipment risk running in front of the swings.
	 There is a good range of physical activities for juniors and seniors Junior slide runout is too high and steep (see picture below).
	 The equipment does not specifically provide for imaginative play.
	 There is no specific provision for disabled access to this play equipment.
	The park is attractive.
	 Its character is derived largely from the undulating site and large trees.
	 Informal surveillance is good from houses on the uphill side of the park.
	 The park is used for informal ball games.
	• There is a picnic table under a tree (not accessible via a path).
	 The entrance to the playground shares a very steep path which is the entry to the kinder, see picture below.
	 Path gradient is not wheelchair accessible.
	 A well-graded path winding more gently up the hill servicing both pre-school and playground will be appreciated by pram- pushing parents as well as wheelchair users.

Playground Recommendations	 This playground would benefit from the following additions: Addition of a freestanding, ground level, wheelchair accessible and usable setting for imaginative play- such as a cubby or a boat, set into a suitable landscape theme Addition of one, slightly challenging senior item such as from the Galaxy range or similar Consider re-locating the swings.
Site Recommendations	 Tree planting for shade and interest. Redesign access path to both play area and kindergarten. Accessible path through play area to picnic table and play items. Consider extending the path into an interesting small bumpy wheelchair and bike circuit.

Dog leash Status	On leash
Planning Overlays	
Role & Context	 This tiny, sloping park is essentially a triangular traffic island. It has a small playground.
	 The park is popular with older primary children and young teenagers for playing football.
	 Its main function is associated with /social /family/recreation.
	 Musca Street Reserve is not far from here. It is further from the homes of ball players so is not favoured for football.



Precinct 4 Zone North Western	KYORA PARADE RESERVE
Functional Design Analysis	 The site is not fenced. Shade is dappled through tall trees. Target age group is junior ,with toddler swing seats. The equipment does not specifically provide for imaginative play. There is no specific provision for disabled access to this play equipment. The park is dominated by a handful of large handsome spotted gums. Informal surveillance is excellent from all sides.
Playground Recommendations	 Install speed bumps or other serious traffic calming measures to slow or redirect traffic near the corner of Kyora Parade and the Boulevarde. Fence the Kyora Parade perimeter entirely, and the upper corner of Corona Street. This will slow ball-playing children from running out onto the road.
Site Recommendations	 A large number of older children also have a stake in this park, and they must also be consulted. The football activities observed after school are considered to be highly valuable. They are often location-sensitive and the idea of asking them to move to the nearby reserve will not necessarily be successful. The large trees are the focus, as they form perfect goal posts. There is a risk to children playing ball games close to the road. Traffic is the source of the threat to children on this site. It is easy to claim that children are at risk and therefore should cease playing football here. However children are too frequently bearing the brunt of what is essentially a driver-behaviour problem.

Dog leash Status	On leash
Planning Overlays	
	 This is an attractive and well-used park with a football oval.
Role & Context	 It is the only playground in this precinct.
	 Its main function is associated with sport and social /family/recreation.



Precinct 5 Zone North Western	LEIGH PARK
	 A lot of older primary/younger secondary children were seen using the park and playground after school.
	 There is little shade, especially from the west.
	 Target age group is junior /senior plus toddler swings.
	 There is no specific provision for disabled access to this play equipment.
Functional Design Analysis	 The maze is a lost opportunity. Synthetic surfacing in the shape of footprints are indistinguishable under the mulch. These funds could have been used to also make this space accessible (while still providing character).
	 The oval is set into the side of a hill. Mature river red gums establish a strong character.
	 There is a sports pavilion sited some distance away from the playground.
	 Informal surveillance is excellent from houses on three sides.
	 There is a well-located picnic table accessible from the concrete path winding from the street.
	 The small cluster of trees near the playground is important. This could be enhanced by additional tree planting.
Playground Recommendations	 Modify the maze so that the surface is wheelchair accessible and connected to the path.
	 Ensure that at least some of the activities are usable front-on by a child in a wheelchair.
	 Consider adding an item to serve multi-aged children such as a double spring see saw with hand grips, or a 'whirl' with partial sides; some children with disabilities can use these items.
	 Make the space under the large deck into a cubby with some role-play activities.
	 Add some trees to provide shade from west.
	 Add some details such as a large tree stump or similar under trees to provide for more imaginative, child-directed play.

Role & Context	 Located on Koonung Creek Reserve. A major bike trail links the reserves along this creek. It has an important role as a stop-off on the trip along the trail. It has a picnic shelter and BBQ.



Precinct 6	
Zone North Western	KOONUNG CREEK RESERVE
	 The main function of the park is picnicking/social /family/recreation and walking/cycling. This playground is the only one serving this precinct and a fairly large zone in the northern corner of the municipality. Koonung Creek Reserve is the major regional open space in North Balwyn. There is a history of conflict between dogs and other park users.
	 There is limited shade over the play area but there is a roofed shelter and a backdrop of trees just to the west of the equipment.
	 Target age group is a mixture of toddler/junior /senior. Though the toddler slide is aimed at young children, there is no suitable access to it [an enormous step of at least 450mm to this slide, and no hand grips].
	 Neither the equipment nor the site specifically provides for imaginative play.
	 There is no provision for disabled access to this play equipment.
	 This playground offers a reasonable range of activities but these are rather bland and there is little which is distinctive about this play area.
Functional Design Analysis	 The parkland is green, undulating and dotted with mixed 'native' trees, remnant species and a swamp. The undulations are formed by the berm which surrounds the eastern freeway.
	 Informal surveillance is restricted (from a few houses only).
	There is no toilet block.
	 There is a BBQ with tables and seats on a concrete slab in a picnic shelter but these are not connected to the path and are not designed for accessibility.
	 There is a gravel path system. It would be easy to link the shelter to the path. Surfaces around shelter are eroding. .



Precinct 6	
Zone North Western	KOONUNG CREEK RESERVE
Playground Recommendations	 Consider the installation of a District-sized playground that caters for all age groups and reflects the natural environment of the park. Utilise the copse of trees on the side of the playground to create some play value based on a natural setting- logs for play; a 'tree house' amongst the trees but not necessarily in them; some quirky log sculptures set in the treed area. These could all be wheelchair accessible.
Site Recommendations	 Upgrade picnic shelter for wheelchair access- ie seamless access linking to path system; ensure access to BBQ and adjust tables and spacing inside shelter. Road access to the park is via a convoluted road system and there is limited parking. Consider modifying the road configuration next to the park in order to accommodate off-street parking bays. Nominate this site to be considered as a potential location for a small, low key, localised BMX track A design should be prepared that incorporates a physical barrier such as a fence or planting to reduce the existing conflict between dogs and other users.

Site Recommendations	 At the same time, a seamless path system must be constructed from the car park across the grass to the playground and a ramped entry across the border be constructed to the maze and environs. An accessible table and /or seating should be provided in shade.

Generally these bridges should be kept low - under 600mm - because of the potential for groin injuries when children slip. In this case, because the handrails are so high, many children will have great difficulty keeping their balance which is further complicated because there are no handgrips at the top. The junior rung ladder is too far from the deck to which it is supposed to provide the only access. Falls between deck and ladder appear likely. There are no handgrips to assist.
Playground Recommendations	 Replace the rung ladder with a stair. Modify the chain bridge to make it usable. Consider adding an accessible play activity under the highest decks and connecting these to a path.

There is a table setting with two seats linked to the path; however it would still be impossible for someone who is disabled and/or in a wheelchair to use the seats or table.

	 The handgrips are too high for a child to reach from the blue net climb
	 Check for head entrapment dimensions in the step ladder hand rails
	 The infill has been patterned into a window outline. Although, this contributes to the theme of the playground, the bottom cross member of the window forms a foothold that does not comply with the requirements for infill.
	 There is almost certainly an entanglement potential in the placement of the slide in relation to the red handgrips - see photograph below. The potential to cause death by strangulation from toggles of cords caught between the slide and handgrip, that tighten as the child moves down the slide is the leading cause of death in playgrounds in the US. This should be attended to urgently. The space needs to be filled in such a way that nothing can become caught.


